Sermon

A New Covenant

In our Old Testament Lesson we are introduced to a problem. The Lord, in talking with Jeremiah, tells him that something <u>needed</u> to be done about the old covenant. God had kept his end of the covenant, but the people had strayed away from it. So God, in his wisdom and love for human kind, came up with a new plan. There will be a new covenant constructed to accommodate the shortcomings of the people.

Now, for most of us, we may wonder just what the old covenant was, and why it was so inadequate. Essentially God had said; *"I will be your God, and you will be my people."* (Lev. 26:12) While it may not seem to have been much of a contract, there is a lot contained in it. What this meant was that God was to be acknowledged as God by the people, and in return, God would care for and about those people. In order to help the people acknowledge God as God, they were given the gift of the 10 commandments, along with other helpful tips on how to make life a worthwhile endeavor. By following all this, not only would they be acknowledging God, but they would find God's favor as a people as well. Their lives would be blessed and filled with purpose.

But the people found it difficult to follow God's ways. Part of the problem is the same as we ourselves face today – it's just <u>easier</u> to give in to temptation and <u>not</u> follow God's ways. It's easier to think about yourself first, rather than think about your neighbor at all. It's easier to credit yourself for achievements, rather than to acknowledge that God had a hand in making things happen for your benefit. It's easier to spend a life taking, rather than spend a life giving. The written rules were just too easy to break. And with the rules continually being broken, the covenant with God is also broken.

It didn't help that the people often wanted the best parts of the covenant for themselves without taking on any responsibility. They liked the blessings, but didn't seem to be fully aware of what it cost when the covenant was broken. The people were either uninformed, or downplayed their responsibilities to that covenant.

In spite of this, we should take note here that God never gave up. God couldn't turn his back totally against the descendants of the one with whom he first made that covenant – Abraham. In God's original plan, Abraham's offspring were supposed to be a light shining to the world, so that the rest of the world could see the benefits of being God's people, and they too would become God's people. Ideally, that was the whole idea of the covenant but, in a nutshell, they weren't much of a light. The covenant wasn't working.

So God – rather than just trash the whole idea – decided that something had to change, and since God could see it was difficult for the people as a whole to change, God decided to do some work on the covenant. The old written covenant had to be reworked into a new covenant. But how?

It could be that God saw that a covenant written on paper (or stone) was only good to a certain extent. It appeared that while the people were aware the written covenant existed, they didn't act as if they were fully aware of what it contained. The problem was that it was external from the people.

So it seems that God figured out that rather than have rules external to us, we should have rules that are internal, built right in, so that we not only know them, but also instinctively follow them. While it helps to become familiar with what is expected, it is better if we have our own personal experience to back it up. Such experience is the best teacher.

Take winter for example. Winter is a dangerous time of year for Canadians. Ice and snow can make life hazardous. Because of this, some might think we should have rules that apply to winter so that our own safety is ensured. It's amazing that more people aren't hurt.

But the reason more people aren't hurt is because we all know about winter, and we are well aware of the dangers involved. If you have lived here any amount of time, you know what is to be expected and what is to be done when winter hits. If it snows, you remove it from the driveway and sidewalks. If ice forms, you put the sand and salt on it. If it's cold you bundle up and turn up the heat.

And we do such things to the extent that we feel they are necessary. We may not bother to shovel every single time it snows, especially if it's only a centimeter. We use our own judgment. We don't need a law written up to tell us that winter can be dangerous and inform us of exactly what we need to do to minimize the danger. Any rules about handling winter are internal. We don't need external rules.

And this is what God means when telling Jeremiah that the new covenant will be written on people's hearts. Just as we learn the rules of winter by living through many, over and over, that's

also how we internalize God's rules for us and find the covenant written in our hearts. We increase our faith by practicing our faith, by telling the good news of the gospel to others, by putting others ahead of ourselves. The more we do this, the more internalized the new covenant becomes in our hearts. And in that process we become better and better at it.

For us then, the external thing that internalizes our understanding of God's covenant, and the way we behave, begins with realizing God's love for us, and the ultimate sacrifice God made for us – Jesus death on the cross. When we become aware that this "seed" had to die in order that we new seeds could have life, that's when we begin to live in that new life. This was how God proved to us, beyond a shadow of doubt, that God's laws are in our own interest. Jesus died on the cross to prove God's love for us. That act of love is what prompts us to love others, and in return prompting them to love yet more people. It is a planting of seeds; a spreading of the light of God, the way God meant it to be in the first place.

Seeds planted on the ground give the promise of a harvest to come; but for that to happen, some seeds have to die. The whole worldly idea of "*I can do whatever I want*", must die to be replaced with an attitude of "*I must do what is best for my fellow humans*." In doing that we find that we too become blessed.

So may your lives be first and foremost a blessing to other people, so that you too can find the blessing of living with God's covenant written in your hearts. Amen.
