Lesson "Luke 2:1 - 7"

¹ In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. ² (This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.) ³ And everyone went to their own town to register. ⁴ So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. ⁵ He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. ⁶ While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, ⁷ and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them.

Sermon

By Rev. Charles Nolting "Joy: For All People"

You may have noticed that in England there is always a joyous celebration whenever an heir to the throne is born. People gather at the palace gates, bands play, fireworks may be set off, and even big guns may be fired in a royal salute. And, when the formal announcement is finally made, applause erupts from the waiting crowds.

It should be with that same mood of joyous celebration that we read of the birth of Jesus. What may be surprising, or even shocking to us, are the people this announcement was first made to. Shepherds were far from considered to be the *crème de la crème* of society. Imagine those shepherds sitting around a fire within the stone walls of an enclosure deep in the night, attempting to keep the chill away. Those who were awake keeping watch were probably talking about whatever kinds of things shepherds might talk about in the middle of the night.

We often tend to romanticize the shepherds and forget just what common people they were. On a social ladder, they were right near the bottom. In a time when your social standing was tied to how religious you were, shepherds – whose job kept them from observing many of the elaborate rituals of worship – were considered to be on the fringes of society, and on the fringes of being cared about by God.

So it should be a huge surprise to us that when it came to God announcing the most royal birth of all time, God chose common, ordinary, bottom-of-the-social-ladder shepherds to be the first to hear this news. Very suddenly, without any kind of warning, they are surrounded by the glory of God, and music like they'd never heard before coming from the heavens announcing to social castaways that a most royal birth has occurred. And the message begins with the unexpected words; "fear not".

That's probably a good message for us to hear as well because we live in an age of anxiety. We are surrounded by a variety of fears that are difficult to ignore. Some are legitimate, and some are not. Some live in fear of COVID. Some live in fear of vaccines. There are fears the earth is heating too fast. Fears that the economy could collapse, or inflation rise too quickly. For those who are facing old age there is the fear of becoming a burden on the family, or becoming ill with some dreaded disease. We may fear being left alone with no one to care for us.

Fortunately the scriptures are filled with messages to help us cope with fear and avoid the panic that can come with it. Many of them encourage us to turn to God in our fears, to trust in God to strengthen and guide us through our times of fear and lessen our angst.

The main way to fight fear is to remember (as we do tonight) that the Messiah has brought eternal joy to all of us who believe. He was God's gift in the flesh, a mirror in which we can see God, and perhaps see ourselves and our situation more clearly. Jesus came to show us that we can overcome all fears, even the greatest fear of all, that of death.

I know that doesn't always help us overcome our fears, but we often run into a problem because we have difficulty knowing the difference between happiness and joy.

Happiness is superficial; joy is real.

Happiness only lasts for a short time; joy is eternal.

Happiness can be bought; joy is a gift.

Happiness is often the thrill of a moment; joy is the thrill of a lifetime.

Happiness is like a spring creek that flows only during certain times; joy is like an eternal spring welling up within us.

Joy is a special word in the New Testament and something that should be easily found at Christmas. You see, Christmas – the coming of the royal son to earth – means God is not absent but rather that God is ever with us. The divine name Emmanuel literally means "God with us". And this is a gift to all humankind who wish to receive it! It is not happiness that has to be purchased, but rather joy that has been given; a joy that overcomes our fears and our anxieties.

Today, and in the days to come, let us give thanks for this incredible gift. Let us leave our fears on God's shoulders and find the joy first announced to humble shepherds – a certain sign that this joy is for all people. Amen.

Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. **Amen.**
