The people were waiting expectantly and were all wondering in their hearts if John might possibly be the Messiah. John answered them all, "I baptize you with water. His winnowing fork is in his hand to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his barn, but he will burn up the chaff with unquenchable fire."

When all the people were being baptized, Jesus was baptized too. And as he was praying, heaven was opened and the Holy Spirit descended on him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased."

Sermon

Upon first looking at our gospel text, it may appear that there is nothing very fascinating about it. Jesus is being baptized, one person amongst a large crowd of others. If you take out the part about the dove coming down from heaven, it really doesn't seem to be that big a deal, does it?

Is baptism a big deal? Or do we just make a big deal of it during normal times? It certainly seems to have some "big deal" qualities about it. Special clothes are purchased or

borrowed, a time and date is specially set aside, a large meal is often prepared, and family and friends are invited not only to the baptism itself, but also to someone's house afterwards. So it is a big deal for us when someone in our social circle gets baptized.

So, if a baptism is important to us, perhaps today is a good day to ask; why? Why is a baptism important to us? Maybe for us it is important because it marks our initial acceptance into God's kingdom. It also marks our being washed free from sin. It may be an important point in our life and spiritual journey because it is a beginning, which we can point to and say; "that's where my faith started".

We might also ask today what made Jesus' baptism special? Wasn't Jesus already accepted by God as being pure and sinless? He didn't need to be washed free from sin. We aren't even told about any parents or relatives being present! Although not mentioned in today's gospel, it is recorded in Matthew that even John the Baptist didn't think Jesus baptism should have occurred, and a short argument ensued with Jesus over his baptism. John the Baptist couldn't see a need for it either! What was the big deal?

In order to discover why it was a big deal – in order to understand the significance of Jesus baptism (not to mention our own), we need to see baptism not as a single act, but as the beginning of a <u>continuing</u> action. It is not the end of anything, but rather the beginning.

For Jesus, it signified the beginning of his work in ministry. It was after this point that Jesus began in earnest, first taking time in the wilderness with God, then calling his disciples, preaching to crowds, and performing miracles to show just how loving and caring God is toward us. Before this point, Jesus was simply known as "the carpenter's son" and possibly a carpenter himself. Luke's account of the event focuses not on the why, but rather on what the event means for the future.

For us, our baptism should also be a focus on what the future holds, and not simply an event from the past where photos might have been taken and a family gathering took place. While it's important for us to remember our baptism, and remind ourselves that we are indeed baptized; we also need to think of our baptism as the beginning point to our Christian present and future. Something special happened, and hopefully that has continued to affect us throughout our lifetimes. It's not something that should be considered "one and done", and then we simply move on with nothing more than a nice memory.

You might think of your baptism like you think of a driver's license. I suspect that it was a rather special day for those who were first were able to drive all on their own (and legally) wherever you felt you wanted to go. Over the years you've probably kept up the practice of driving and continually update yourself when it comes time to renew your driver's license. Very few people let it lapse. In fact, as you get older, you may find yourself guarding it more and more. You really don't want to lose it. Getting your drivers license was a special event that has continued to be with you since that time, and you probably want to continue having it well into the future.

That is one way we might view our baptism. It was an important event, but for it to be more than just a moment in the past, it also doesn't hurt to renew it through remembrance and use of the covenant associated with it – a covenant found over and over in the Bible: "I will be their God, and they will be my people". It's an event that should continue to be helpful and useful to us our entire lives, which makes it a big deal.

Another reason baptism is a big deal is seen with the emphasis that Luke puts on this lesson. He doesn't concern himself so much with John the Baptist as other gospel writers have done, but rather on the coming of the Holy Spirit upon Jesus. Luke wants to emphasize that it is the Holy Spirit who initiates Jesus mission and ministry, and not John.

In many ways, what this emphasis also points out to us is that while the action of baptism is important, what is more important is the acceptance of the Holy Spirit into our lives, and its presence continuing throughout our lives. This holy presence in our lives is what keeps us driving along on our spiritual journey. Its rules keep us out of the ditches and from hitting trees. You could even say that when we get hit by something else in life, the Holy Spirit provides the insurance so we don't take the brunt all by ourselves. We have backup.

So now what does your baptism mean to you? Is it a big deal for you, or was it only a big deal for you? Does it still affect your life, or was it only an event from the past? Would you consider your baptism to be only a photograph, or is it a continually moving motion picture that is still going today? How we view our own baptism, affects what we do today, and tomorrow. May God be with us to not only remind us of our baptism, but also to rejuvenate us in our baptism. Amen.
