Sermon

“A Saving Community”*

The parable of the Good Samaritan is possibly one of the best-known parables of Jesus, who used it in an attempt to demonstrate the attitude one is to have in order to inherit eternal life. It is a story demonstrating the utmost compassion shown to a person who was thought to be an enemy. What makes it even more astonishing is that the like-minded people who passed by the wounded man appear to pretend he doesn't even exist. Those who might be expected to be the heroes are the villains, and the expected villain turns out to be the hero.

It's an example of the topsy-turvy world that Jesus called “the kingdom of God”, something apparently we are all seeking. Interestingly, in Luke 17:21 Jesus mentioned that, “*the kingdom of God is within you and among you*” as in right here and right now. While the question about finding eternal life put to Jesus was spoken of as some future event, the parable makes it

quite clear that we are to be living this kingdom right here and right now, not just at some future point in time.

And this is brought about when we behave as if the kingdom of God is among and within us; meaning that we are to think and live differently from the rest of the world. It means that, if we see someone in trouble – regardless of who they are – we help them. They may not be “one of us”. Their problem may be one we’d rather not deal with, but that doesn’t allow us to just pass by on the other side of the road. We are to have care, and concern, and respect for our fellow human beings, and when we show that, we are being part of the community known as the kingdom of God.

As we gather together on this Rally Sunday, let us remember that we are part of that community which God has called us to. We are a community whose purpose is not only to live in the kingdom of God, but also to show the world what the kingdom of God looks like and why it is a better place than most can even imagine.

Perhaps it would help to think of in this way: Like the Good Samaritan, Jesus has come to help us regardless of who we are or what we have been. We know we are in need of assistance, lying beaten on the side of the road of life. We have difficulties in life that require help. Unlike most who breeze past without any regard to our situation (or perhaps even make our situation worse), Jesus comes to us, not because we are somehow worthy, but simply because we are in need of assistance.

Now consider the mindset of that traveller who received assistance in our parable. What would he have been thinking as he was recovering? Would he not have a newfound respect for his savior? Would he not praise up the Samaritan to any who would listen? Our mission then, as a community, is to do the same with the one who has come to save us. Amen.

Your blessed saints who have died now rest in your presence. Give us thankful hearts for those who have been examples of faith in our lives, and receive us with joy when we come to share eternal life with you. God of grace, **hear our prayer.**

Gathered together in the sweet communion of the Holy Spirit, gracious God, we offer these and all our prayers

to you; through Jesus Christ, our Savior, who taught us to pray.

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. **Amen.**
