on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. ¹³In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; ¹⁴this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory. ¹⁵I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason 16 do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. ¹⁷I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ. the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, ¹⁸so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, ¹⁹ and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. ²⁰God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places. ²¹ far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. ²²And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, ²³which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

Sermon

Today we celebrate All Saints Sunday, a day specially set aside for remembering people who blessed our lives through their words, their actions, and their sharing with us. They may well have been people who shaped us in some way, inspired us, and perhaps weren't even aware of it.

Most people think about grandparents when talking about saints who shaped their lives. I never got to know my grandparents, which made becoming a grandparent a scary prospect for me because I didn't have a clue as to what I was supposed to do. No one had ever shown me, and I was unable to find any grandparent courses available online. You would think that must be taught somewhere!

I suppose the good thing to come out of all that is that my lack of grandparents led me to find others in my life who could fill a gap I knew needed filling. In such a situation one picks their own mentors. If you are fortunate, you are able to choose a number of mentors – the saints who gave and perhaps continue to give you guidance - at some point over the course of your lifetime.

Today I want to remember Arnold, my most fond mentor. I met Arnold at choir, an older man as gifted at singing as I am, meaning they stuck us both in the back row, where he was the official supplier and distributer of "Halls" cough drops to choir members.

Arnold had been a good Lutheran all his life with his beginnings in the Ottawa area, and then sent to defend our country against the Nazi's by travelling down to New York City and assigned to help film segments in support of the war effort. He told me his war stories such as collecting the silver wrappings from cigarette packages, to be put together as screens for lights to reflect off of.

After the war, Arnold and Les, his best friend from childhood, parlayed their "military expertise" into working at the CBC in Montreal where they became Canada's first special effects team, smoke and mirrors being their specialty. Using only their imaginations and whatever they could scrounge for cheap, they made all kinds of amazing things happen in CBC productions.

After a long career with the CBC, the pair retired early, and purchased a patent for a film cleaning solution from Kodak, starting their own film restoration business in Arnold's basement in Belleville, Ontario. I know that sounds a bit off, but Arnold once showed me a filthy roller and somberly informed me that he had all the dirt from the film "Gandhi", as that particular roller had cleaned the original before being copied. He had film production contacts all over North America and even parts of Europe.

As great as all this is, the most important thing to me about Arnold was his faith. He showed me that faith isn't some dour or dull prospect, but filled with joy, humor, and blessings. His example became a part of my example to the world.

I mention all this because today I want you to consider who your mentors of faith were in your lives. How did you meet them? How did they affect you? How did they influence you? What about them do you still copy to this day?

I ask these questions to remind you that we are surrounded by the saints living and dead not only today, but every day. Remember them and how they blessed your life with their lives of faith. Copy their good habits, and give thanks to God for their positive influence. And then, be saints to others, bringing them blessings in any way you can. Amen.
