Gospel "Mark 9:17 – 29" Glory to you, O Lord.

A man in the crowd answered, "Teacher, I brought you my son, who is possessed by a spirit that has robbed him of speech. Whenever it seizes him, it throws him to the ground. He foams at the mouth, gnashes his teeth and becomes rigid. I asked your disciples to drive out the spirit, but they could not." "You unbelieving generation." Jesus replied, "how long shall I stay with you? How long shall I put up with you? Bring the boy to me." So they brought him. When the spirit saw Jesus, it immediately threw the boy into a convulsion. He fell to the ground and rolled around, foaming at the mouth. Jesus asked the boy's father, "How long has he been like this?" "From childhood." he answered. "It has often thrown him into fire or water to kill him. But if you can do anything, take pity on us and help us." " 'If you can'?" said Jesus. "Everything is possible for one who believes." Immediately the boy's father exclaimed, "I do believe; help me overcome my unbelief!" When Jesus saw that a crowd was running to the scene, he rebuked the impure spirit. "You deaf and mute spirit," he said, "I command you, come out of him and never enter him again." The spirit shrieked, convulsed him violently and came out. The boy looked so much like a corpse that many said, "He's dead." But Jesus took him by the hand and lifted him to his feet, and he stood up. After Jesus had gone indoors, his disciples asked him privately, "Why couldn't we drive it out?" He replied, "This kind can come out only by prayer." The Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, O Christ.

Sermon

For those of you who've ever done a Bible Study with me, you are aware that one of my first go-to questions is: "what strikes you as odd, or unusual in this passage?" The sentence that got to me comes after the boy is brought forward and Jesus is diagnosing the boy by interrogating the father, while explaining how, "everything is possible for one who believes."

What strikes me as odd is the father's reply: "I do believe; help me overcome my unbelief!" What is he saying here? It sounds to me like the father is saying that "I believe what you are saying is true, but I don't believe it can happen to me."

It's kind of like when we are exposed to those advertisements that claim they can help us make cash fast! I believe that could be true for the person telling me this information, but I don't believe it would actually apply to me.

So, what are <u>we</u> to make of this line? In many ways, it suggests a certain helplessness, as if there is nothing one can do about a situation themselves, so we need to get someone else to take care of it.

Such an attitude isn't helped when we read that the disciples wondered why they couldn't cast out the spirit themselves. Jesus answer to them is prayer. They need more time with God, they need to improve their relationship with the creator because the more time you spend with someone, the more you understand how they work, and the more knowledge you gain from them.

I realize that there are times when we may have the same feelings as those disciples; we may ask ourselves why can't <u>we</u> seem to do anything? We may perhaps first want to look to that father of the ill son, who felt that Jesus was the only one who could heal. For him to

overcome his unbelief, or for us to overcome any of our own unbelief, Jesus advice to the disciples would also apply. Deepen your relationship with God through prayer, and things will happen.

I believe that applies very much to us as well. Look at how far we have come in the past years. A new congregation, a new location, and a new ministry focus. While some may have felt there has been a lot of loss, I hope we aren't forgetting what we are actually gaining.

Think of the man from Matthew 13:44, who sold everything, absolutely everything he owned, so that he could purchase a field that he knew had a great treasure in it. Think of how Jesus absolutely emptied himself on the cross so that we all might gain. The kingdom of heaven isn't about constant acquisitions and building more, but about giving it all up, so that we might be renewed and gain the very best.

Jesus sets no limits on the power of faith. While I'm certain we believe, perhaps our job at this time is to ask God to: "help us with our unbelief". Help us to feel God's presence moving us forward. Help us to build each other up. Help us to reach out in any way we can to the world around us. Help us to let go of what used to be in order to embrace the greatness of what can be. Dear Lord, help us with our unbelief so that we can courageously move forward to the future you have in mind for us. Amen.
